WE'RE IN THE PATH OF TOTALITY!



In case you haven't heard yet (that's impossible, right?!), Texas is in for a treat for the total solar eclipse coming our way! Here are some important reminders when trying to catch the eclipse:

Eclipse begins -12:23 pm

Totality begins -1:40 pm,

- Totality lasts approx. 2 min & 33 seconds
- End of Partial Eclipse 3:02 pm

Please also keep in mind that eye safety is most important when enjoying the phenomenon of the total solar eclipse. The glasses provided by City Center may be found on the Safe Solar Viewer manufacturer list by the <u>American Astronomical</u> <u>Society</u> (Hangzhou Retsing Eyewear Co., Ltd.). Looking directly at the sun during a solar eclipse is unsafe and can cause temporary or even permanent damage to your eyes. Don't remove your eclipse glasses until the very last bit of the sun is gone and you can no longer see any light through them. In Fort Worth, the total eclipse is projected to last approximately 2 min & 33 seconds. Once the little bit of light reappears after totality, immediately put your eclipse glasses back on for protection.

Should you have any concerns about using eclipse glasses, there are great <u>Indirect</u> <u>Viewing Methods</u> to consider that allows the sun to pass through the small holes and you can see the eclipse in the shadow on the ground. Suggested items include a colander, a hole punched in an index card or Johnny's favorite - a Ritz cracker. It's his favorite because after the eclipse is over, you also have a snack!

Texas weather is unpredictable, so whether there's rain or sun on April 8, we will TOTALITY have fun! If it's sunny, meet us on the Garage 2 rooftop with your eclipse glasses in hand. If it rains, we'll set up by the skybridge to Garage 2 with goodies to share (while supplies last) starting at 11:30 am: Moon Pies, Space Dunk Oreos, special treats from City Club and more! **REMEMBER: The Garage 2 Rooftop will be closed to vehicles on Monday!**
